Graduation Rate

Graduation rate is calculated by identifying the number of MDiv students who entered the program <u>six</u> years ago this fall (entered in fall 2019) and the number of MASC students who entered the program <u>four</u> years ago this fall (entered in fall 2021). Then we identify the number of individual students from that group who have since graduated. This is the graduation rate.

MDiv	70%	10 students entered in 2019. Of this group, 7 have graduated.
MASC	100%	1 students entered in 2021. Of this group, 1 has graduated.

Placement after Graduation

An important part of a school's effectiveness is following students after their graduation to see if receiving a degree made a difference in whether they were achieving their placement goals. ATS requires us to report these figures annually. These results are from the past five years.



Unitarian Universalist Ministerial Fellowship Committee (MFC) We are a Unitarian Universalist seminary, and so we report about our graduates' success in passing the MFC ordination interview. The MFC reports results to us (we are not given names or other identifying characteristics – only that a ministerial candidate graduated from our school). The MFC ranks candidates from 1 through 3. Receiving a grade of 1 indicates that they have passed immediately. Category 2 means that the candidate still has some work to do and needs to complete the assigned work and possibly reappear before the MFC. Category 3 means that the candidate has some serious deficits.

I appreciated all the ways I could use my own independent studies, because some of the above I provided for myself and learned myself, and Starr King gave me the space to do so.


In all areas, Starr King School for the Ministry was excellent.


